What is the Program for Emerging Leaders?

- PEL is three-year program created and run by NDU's Center for the Study of Weapons of Mass Destruction whose goal is to foster a community of rising US government leaders with the knowledge and skill-set to respond to the dangers of WMD.
- Candidates are *not* required to have WMD expertise, but must demonstrate leadership potential within their agency/organization and an interest in learning about WMD.
- PEL addresses tasking from Joint Staff's J-8/Joint Requirements Office to NDU's WMD Center to: "facilitate interagency and DoD civilian education, administering and leading programs to strengthen the combating WMD community."

PEL aims to create a cadre of future leaders with the knowledge and skill-set to respond to the dangers of WMD.

Program Details: Membership

- Members: Early to mid-career USG employees (civilian GS 11-13's, military O-3's and O-4's)
- Selection: ~25 members selected each year
- Membership term: Three years with three classes running concurrently
- Graduate credit: Upon successful completion of required contact hours, reading, and writing assignments, members will receive six hours of National Defense University graduate school credit and an NDU Certificate in WMD Studies

Program Details: Calendar for Three-Year Program

- Week-long Summer Immersion (June of first year)
 - Seminars and lectures
 - Site visits
- Small-group activities (four or five times per year)
 - Day-long site visits
 - Leadership Dinners
 - Expert-led discussions
- Two-day Winter Workshop (annually)
 - Panel discussions on WMD issues
 - Lectures and small-group activities


Program Activity: Winter Workshop


Application Requirements

- Eligibility requirements:
 - Demonstrated leadership potential within agency/organization
 - USG employees (GS-11 thru GS-13, O-3's and O-4's)
 - Minimum three years post-baccalaureate experience
 - Job responsibilities related to national security
 - Interest in learning about WMD and related policy issues
- Application: personal statement, resume, academic transcript, letter of nomination, and statement of support submitted through <http://pel.dodlive.mil/applying-to-the-program>
- Applications available in September, due on 19 December, notification of acceptance in February

Final Thoughts: GAO Recognition of PEL


In its November 2010 Report to Congressional Committees, *National Security: An Overview of Professional Development Activities Intended to Improve Interagency Collaboration*, GAO noted,

- “In our review, DOD provided the majority of professional development activities. These included... leadership development programs with a national security focus, such as the Program for Emerging Leaders at the National Defense University's Center for the Study of Weapons of Mass Destruction.” (Page 11)
- “Of the 11 reported programs, 6 leadership development programs were open to and encouraged interagency participation. Two of these 6 – the Program for Emerging Leaders at NDU's Center for the Study of Weapons of Mass Destruction, and State's National Security Executive Leadership Seminar – intended to create an interagency cohort of leaders who can work together seamlessly on national security issues. For example, to promote a professional network among future U.S. government leaders in the field of weapons of mass destruction, NDU's Center for the Study of Weapons of mass Destruction offered Program for Emerging Leaders students a variety of ways to connect outside the classroom...” (Pages 25-6)
